From the Headmaster...

Masculinity

What do points on a scoreboard have to do with teaching boys how to be men of substance and impact? Nothing!

My job as a coach was to always love my players. Their job as a team was to love each other.

When a season was completed each year it wasn't just a season of football but really a season of life.

All the problems that I had to deal with as related to my players and football, were not just problems, they were symptoms. Symptoms of the single biggest failure of our society. We simply do not do a good enough job of teaching boys how to be men.

If we do not help boys become men, then we really won't be able to fix anything else in this country we call America.

We must try with every ounce of fiber in our bodies to teach boys masculinity and a code of conduct for manhood.

Life, more than anything is really a journey that most athletes go through, an awful lot of men period, because we're searching based on all the wrong things – money, fame, power, individual recognition. Life is a story of a man's search for a heart. It is also the ability, first and foremost, to be a man is to enter and maintain meaningful relationships.

The thing I've taken from the game of football into my current life, really, is the concept of team.

If we don't address this issue, we really can't deal with the other issues. And that primarily, critical issue is a concept of what it means to be a man. If we don't fix our understanding, and get a proper definition of masculinity and manhood, I don't think we can properly address other issues.

I believe that each young man I ever coached are given in our culture a threefold criteria for what it means to be a man. I think those are a lie, and I think they lead to tremendous dysfunction both in marriages and relationships, and in the social problems of America.

The three components of false masculinity are: athletic ability, sexual conquest, and economic success.

Masculinity, first and foremost, ought to be defined in terms of relationships. It ought to be taught in terms of the capacity to love and to be loved. I will never look back at the life of any of my former players and measure their success based on what they've acquired or achieved or what they own. The only thing that is really going to matter is the relationships they had. It is going, in the end, to come down to what kind of father are they? What kind of husband are they? What kind of teammate were they? What kind of son were they? What kind of friend were they? Success comes in terms of relationships.

The only other criteria for masculinity is that all of us ought to have some kind of cause, some kind of purpose in our lives that's bigger than our own individual hopes, dreams, wants, and desires. At the end of our life, we ought to be able to look back over it from our deathbed and know somehow the world was a better place because we lived, we loved, we were other-centered, and other focused.

Accepting responsibility, leading courageously, enacting justice on behalf of others are the necessary traits. We must possess empathy for each other. Feel for each other – have compassion. Feel what the other person feels. Not feeling for someone, but with someone. If you can put yourself in another man's shoes, that's a great gift to have for a lifetime.

God gives each person X amount of talents. The question isn't how many talents you've been given. That's the Sovereignty of God. The real question is what you do with the ones you have.

If a guy has ten and brings ten everyday, that's pretty good. If you have two and you bring two everyday, that's just as good. What more could we possibly ask of him?

We must improve in all facets of life daily. In the end, it's not the mistakes you make that really matter. It's what you do with what you've learned from those mistakes. And it's how you respond to the mistakes of others.

The Bible tells us "When I was a child, I did childish things. But when I became a man, I put away childish things."

You still want to have this childish faith. You've got to stop doing childish things when you become a man, which is all the little pettiness, the comparing and competing with other people. If you trust in and depend on some kind of spiritual power, then you can trust in and depend on the people next to you because you know that God is working through them as well. So you put away childish things as you become a man, but you still live with childlike faith and trust in both God and the people around you.

I pray God gives each of us focus and courage to be a real man.

FOR ALL SCHOOL PARENTS:

Immunization Survey:

It's that time of year again where all of our student records are evaluated in order to comply with the state of Alabama immunization law. Letters will be sent out this week for those students that have immunization forms that have expired. Also, please be aware this year that the state of Alabama is requiring the chicken pox vaccine for all K4 through the 7th Grade. (Your child will be exempt if they have already had the chicken pox). You may also receive a note if we don't have a copy of your child's social security card or birth certificate. We ask you to please comply quickly so that your child's record may be complete.

PARENTS OF JUNIORS:

PSAT Information: This month the Junior class will be taking the PSAT on October 15th. This is an annual test that is given nationwide and is a co-sponsored program by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

PSAT/NMSQT stands for Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. It's a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT Reasoning Test™. It also gives the students a chance to enter National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) scholarship programs.

The PSAT/NMSQT measures:

- Critical reading skills
- Math problem-solving skills
- Writing skills

The students will be given a practice booklet so they are aware of the testing format before the day of the PSAT.

Selective Service

All senior young men are required to register with **Selective Service** within **30 days of your eighteenth birthday**. The Selective Service is a government agency whose job is to provide untrained manpower for the Armed Forces if there is a national emergency. You can register online at www.sss.gov or go by the Post Office and complete a registration form.

Senior Conferences/Deadlines for College Applications:

By now I have met with your child and they are focusing on making application to the colleges we discussed for them. Please make sure and encourage them during this grueling process so that they may reach their goals that I have assigned them individually. **December 1** is the "rule of thumb" deadline for college applications. I believe that it is never too early to be making application with their college of

choice. Remember, early application = early acceptance. I am very pleased to say I have helped many of my eager seniors thus far in this process and have been very excited with their progress. As the students know by now I am readily available to you and your child to help you through this step by step process.

College Opportunities/Scholarships

Each year a large 3-ring binder is compiled noting any scholarships, college opportunities, deadlines, etc. that seniors need to know. This is information that is mailed to me from various colleges across the nation. The notebook is housed in the Guidance Office, and checked out by students during elective classes. Also, as I have received information I have tried to immediately let the students know of each scholarship opportunity. Plus, I visit 12G and 12W during English to make them aware of any new information I have received. I did not receive a huge response on parents receiving an e-mail on scholarship information. Therefore, I am choosing to e-mail you as parents individually when I am working with your child on a particular scholarship instead of through mass e-mails.

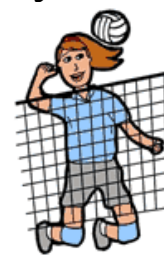
JV Cheerleader Fundraiser Cake Raffle

Hooper Academy Pee Wee Football 2008

Hooper Academy 22 Prattville Christian Academy 0

The Hooper Pee Wee Football Team traveled to Prattville Christian Academy to take on the Panthers in the first game of the year for both teams. The Panthers won the coin toss and received the football first. The Panthers drove the ball for 2 first downs before being held by a strong Colt defense that included stellar play from John David Watts, Logan Cargille, E.J. Brasington, and Curtis Dorsey. The Panthers elected to punt and the Colt offense took the field for the first time.

Running backs Curtis Dorsey and Robert Smith would find huge holes in the Panther defense behind the excellent blocking of Kye Todd, Garrett Wilsford, Joshua Heath, E.J. Brasington, and Hayden Davis. The Colts drove 65 yards in only 6 plays, with Curtis Dorsey taking the handoff from quarterback Foster Reese Smith for the 8 yard score. The 2-point conversion was pounded into the end zone by Dorsey behind the aggressive Colt line. The stingy Colt defense took the field and would not let Panthers breathe with Taylor Campbell and Joshua Heath making tackles in the backfield. On third down, the Panthers attempted to run outside but Foster Reese Smith and Robert Smith were on the spot to stop the runner for no gain. Prattville Christian was forced to punt once again.

The strong Colt offense took the field and quarterback Foster Reese Smith faked a handoff and ran 55 yards for a touchdown. The score was called back for a holding penalty, but the offense was not to be denied. On the next play, Robert Smith took the pitch and ran behind the blocking of wide receiver David Moncrief and tight end John David

Watts and scampered 65 yards for the touchdown. The 2-point conversion failed the Colts led 14-0 at the beginning of the 2nd quarter. The Panther offense would not fare well against the strong Colt defense the rest of the night. Led by defensive tackles Austin Beach, Daniel Armstrong, and Dustin Bethea the Panthers were unable to gain a first down. The Colts took possession at midfield and it took only 3 plays for Robert Smith to scamper in for the touchdown from 30 yards out. The 2-point conversion was rammed in by E.J. Brasington on a dive right to close out the scoring for the first half of play. The Colts led 22-0 at half.

The Colts defense gave up 4 first downs in the game and only 1 in the second half. Parker Robinson, Kalbe Cardinale, and Trey Henry were major contributors to the defensive shutout in the second half. The defense was led by John David Watts with 6 tackles and six other players had four tackles each. The defensive unit played very well throughout the game. The offense was led by Robert Smith and his 104 yards rushing and Curtis Dorsey finished the night with 94 yards rushing. Logan Cargille had one catch for 5 yards. The offense produced 221 yards rushing on the night running both inside and outside behind a strong offensive line. The final score was Hooper 22 and Prattville Christian 0. The Colts are 1-0 and travel to Morgan Academy for a tough test with the Senators.

Hooper Academy 6 Morgan Academy 0

The Hooper Colts traveled to Selma for a tough Pee Wee Football game with the Senators from Morgan Academy. The Colts won the toss and started their first offensive possession at their own 40 yard line. Running

backs Curtis Dorsey and Robert Smith ran the ball extremely hard behind the offensive line of Kye Todd, Garrett Wilsford, Joshua Heath, E.J. Brasington, and Hayden Davis. Quarterback Foster Reese Smith guided the offense down the field and Curtis Dorsey ran it in from 26 yards out for the score. The 2-point conversion failed and the Colts led 6-0. The determined Colts defense took the field and smothered the Senators offense from the opening snap. After 3 plays for negative yardage the Senators punted to the Colts. The mighty Colts offense sprang quarterback Foster Reese Smith for 50 yards for a touchdown, but was called back due to a holding penalty and ended the drive.

The Colts drove the ball but were unable to score points in the first half. The first half ended on an incomplete pass to Logan Cargille from Curtis Dorsey. The Colts led 6-0 at halftime and the defense had yet to give up a first down to Morgan Academy.

The second half started and the defense picked up right where it left off. Linebackers John David Watts, E.J. Brasington, and Curtis Dorsey were run stoppers in the middle and defensive ends Hayden Davis and Taylor Campbell kept the outside bottled up all night. The Colt offense had runs of 38 and 40 yards called back because of holding penalties and this kept the game close. The offense could not put away the pesky Senators team because of mistakes and left the game in the hands of the tough defense. Defensive tackles Joshua Heath, Austin Beach, Garrett Wilsford, Kye Todd, Trey Henry and Dustin Bethea were instrumental in clogging the middle so the Senators could not get their offense in gear.

Late in the fourth quarter the Senators put together their only drive of the night with 3 first downs to get to the Colts 25 yard line. There the Colts made a stand with tackles by a herd of Colts on the first and second downs. On third down, the Senators attempted to roll out their quarterback and Hayden Davis contained the outside and Parker Robinson

sacked the quarterback from his defensive tackle position. The Senators tried the middle of the Colts defense on fourth down with no success. The Colts took possession with 3:25 left in the game. Curtis Dorsey and Robert Smith ran hard into the middle of the Senators defense and gained 2 first downs. The Colts strong offensive line was pushing the Senators back to midfield, but was unable to gain another first down to run out the clock. On fourth down and short the Colts punted to the Senators with 57 seconds left in the game. The Colts rushed the Morgan quarterback and he threw down field to a covered receive. Safety David Moncrief intercepted the ball and the Colts ran the clock out for a hard fought 6-0 victory over Morgan Academy. The Colts defense gave up 3 first downs on the night and have yet to be scored upon. The Colts offense was effective, but shot themselves in the foot with penalties. The Colts are 2 and 0 and play Autauga Academy next.

Hooper Academy 24 Autauga Academy 0

The Hooper Academy Pee Wee Football Team took a 2 and 0 record to Prattville to play the Autauga Academy Generals. The Colts won the toss and took possession at the 35 yard line to begin the game. The first play from scrimmage, Curtis Dorsey took the handoff from quarterback Foster Reese Smith and rambled 30 yards to the General's 35 yard line. On the next play, Dorsey ran behind Joshua Heath, E.J. Brasington, Hayden Davis and Taylor Campbell on the right side for a 35 yard scoring run. The 2-point conversion was tacked on by Dorsey and the Colts led 8-0 early. The stubborn Colt defense dominated the Generals throughout the first half and did not give up a first down. Led by defensive tackles Joshua Heath, Austin Beach, Garrett Wilsford, Kye Todd, Trey Henry and Dustin Bethea the Colts were unstoppable in the first half. Led by linebackers John David Watts,

E.J. Brasington and Curtis Dorsey the Generals were unable to move the ball.

The Colts took possession on the 50 yard line and Robert Smith took the pitch behind the left side of the offense consisting of David Moncrief, John David Watts, Kye Todd, and Garrett Wilsford and sped 25 yards down the left sideline. On the next play, Robert Smith burst around left end for a 25 yard touchdown with the help of blocking wide receivers Logan Cargille and Kaleb Cardinale. The 2-point conversion was bulled in from the 3 yard line by E.J. Brasington and the Colts led 16-0 midway through the first quarter. The Generals offense took the field and the results were the same. The Colt defense would not allow the Generals to run inside and the secondary of Robert Smith, Foster Reese Smith, David Moncrief, and Logan Cargille would not allow runs to the outside. The outmanned Generals punted to the Colts and they took possession at the 45 yard line. Once again, Robert Smith took the pitch from Foster Reese Smith and raced down the sideline for the score. The 2-point conversion by John David Watts was good and the Colts led 24-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The coaches decided it was time for the younger Colts to get as much game experience as possible. Every starter possible was pulled to allow the younger players to get in on the action. The Colt defense did not lose a step and stymied the Generals the rest of the half and throughout the night. John David Watts intercepted a pass late in the game to stop a Generals offensive threat. Linebackers Dustin Bethea, Trey Henry, and Kye Todd clogged the middle and funneled the Autauga Academy runners to cornerback Daniel Armstrong and safety Kaleb Cardinale. Parker Robinson and Austin Beach manned the middle and did not allow Autauga to get off the ball cleanly. The offense gained valuable experience for some younger players and produced yards in the

second half without scoring. The Colt offense had five different players score on the night. The Colt defense has yet to be scored upon in 3 games and gave up 3 first downs to the Generals. The Colts won 24-0 and take a 3 and 0 record home to face Fort Dale Academy next.

On August 28th, the Hooper Academy Colts routed the Kingwood Christian School Lions 43-2 to record their first victory of 2008. The game was never in doubt, as the Colts jumped to a 30-0 halftime lead and coasted the rest of the way.

Hooper was led by Junior Morgan Faulkner. Faulkner accounted for 3 touchdowns. Two of his scores came running the ball from his tailback position, where he had a total of 201 yards rushing on the night. He also intercepted a pass and returned it for a 30 yard score.

The offense was guided by senior quarterback Hayden Kelly, who led an efficient attack. Kelly finished the game going 8-13 for 97 yards. Kelly threw one touchdown pass to each of the Garretts, Junior Garrett Smith and Senior Garrett Guthrie.

Defensively, Garrett Guthrie led the way, along with sophomore Casey Walker. They

each recorded 5 tackles each. During the night, the Colts forced 6 turnovers. In addition to Faulkner's interception, Kelly, and Junior Hunter Kendrick also picked off passes. Three different Colts recovered fumbles as well. Juniors Thomas Langley and Alex Paulk each accounted for a recovery, and Senior Shane Hudson recovered a fumble for a Hooper touchdown.

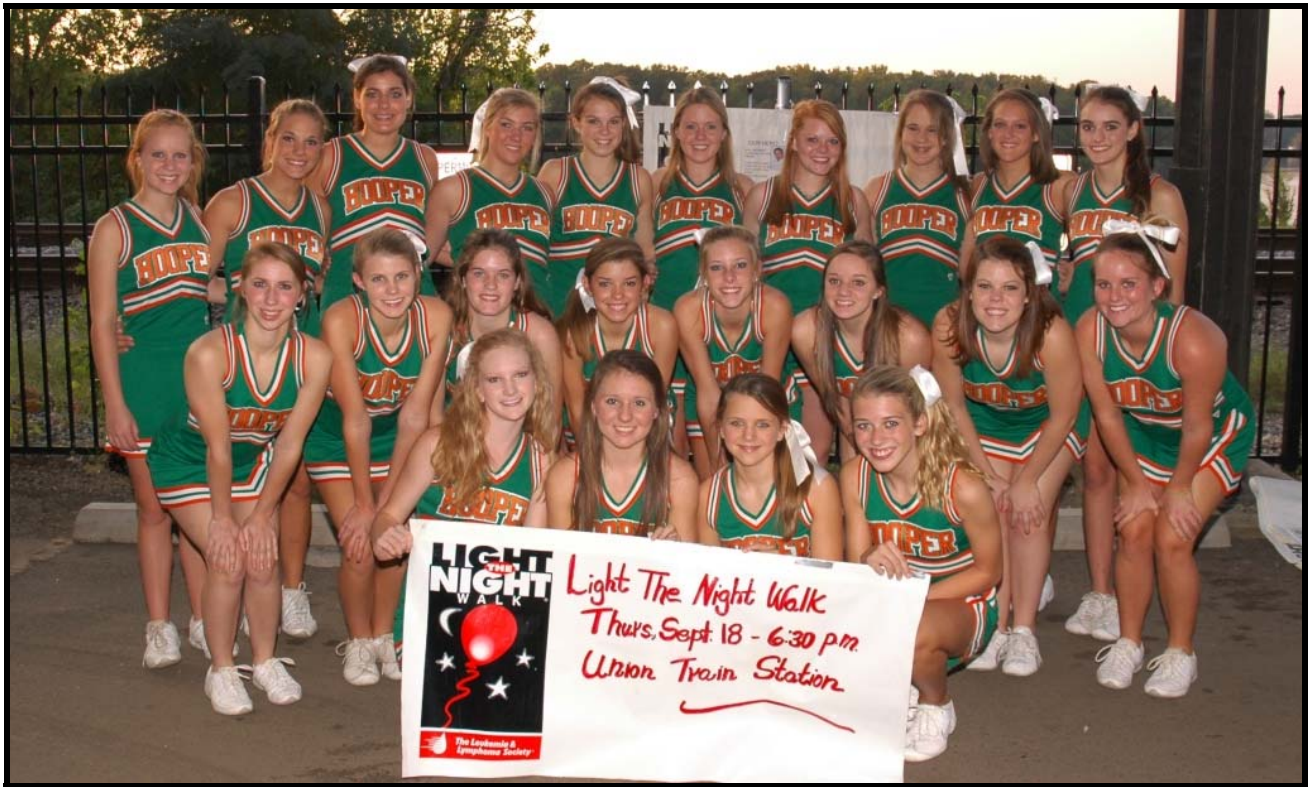

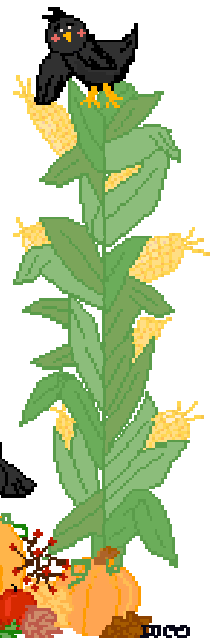
